These Noisy Kids

"Knock-it-off, are the only words I've heard from him this past week," said Donna.

Donna and Fred's grandkids are down for the summer. She called asking for help, since Fred was complaining that the kids are too loud. His irritation was causing tension and putting a damper on the summer vacation.

To make certain we got this one right, we asked him to bring in one of the grandkids.

When sounds are not commonly heard, the brain will pay extra attention to ensure you are aware of this new noise. It is a primitive mental response to keep us safe. This same effect is when you stay in a hotel and new sounds keep you from sleeping well. Your brain is not sure what to do with the new noise and wants you to decide if the sound is important.

When kids are out of the house, our brains adapt to the quieter environment. Then grandkids visit, bringing noise into what was a quiet home. These unfamiliar sounds get attention from our brain, and this constant attention is a bit exhausting, which can result in grumpy people.

Depending on the length of their visit, you may just need to accept the sound and focus on relaxing. For others however, the best fix is a program adjusted for the kids.

If you wear hearing aids and notice you are getting tired and irritable with kids in the house, you can have one program to reduce these sounds. Even though they may be here temporarily, a program set to allow you comfort and confidence around them can ease everyone's experience.

Donna and Fred brought in their granddaughter to ensure we got a program that would soften the sounds. We set up the program then they went to lunch with the whole family and called after lunch to let us know it went well, Fred was relaxed and engaged.

If you struggled when around younger people, it is time to have a checkup for your hearing. Call my office, 941-244-9300, with any questions about program settings.

PLEASE INVEST IN BAY LAKE ESTATES

In March all Bay Lake residents were invited to help craft a message to ELS. The message started with "We know ELS invests money in projects in Bay Lake every year. We would like to suggest a few high-impact projects for your budgeting consideration."

That approach wasn't new. Many parks put together what they call their "dream list" every year and send it in just to see what happens.

But we added a new twist to our approach. We recognized that ELS may have some but probably not much—motivation to fund our dream projects. As a business they kind of owe it to their investors to spend as little as possible to keep us residents satisfied—not particularly happy.

We decided to look for projects to recommend that would likely make ELS happy. Of course, if a project would make us residents happy, too, so much the better!

We identified several categories of projects that would be likely to be attractive to ELS. They included...

Safety related. Improving safety has measurable, profit-enhancing side effects and attracts new residents, especially in "55 and over" communities.

Asset life lengthening. If, for example, there's a way to make a storage building last longer before it has to be torn down and replaced, ELS might want to do that project. If that project also happened to make the building look nicer, that's something residents might be happy about.

Reduce waste or other operating costs. Pretty obvious why this would be attractive to ELS, right?

Improve appearance or resident enjoyment of the park at moderate investment expense. From the park owner's perspective, if a "reasonable" investment can make the park more attractive to potential residents, that may help increase occupancy rate by securing

a new resident faster after the previous one moves out. Difficult or impossible to "prove," but everyone recognizes it's probably true.

To try to generate project ideas within these categories, several opportunities were set up for residents to contribute their thoughts and ideas. Part of the March association meeting was set aside for brainstorming and discussion. Two one-hour brainstorming meetings were scheduled—one in the morning and one in the evening. Lastly, all residents were encouraged to simply e-mail their contributions in if they were unable to attend any of the brainstorming sessions.

Since capital budgeting (referred to as "CAP-X") is a year-ahead process with ELS, we won't know for a long time if our approach actually helped "get us any money," so to speak. But hopefully we'll get some feedback from ELS management long before then on the usefulness of the exercise we went through.

COMCAST NEWS

What is new? Making it easier for our customers!

Our latest development in self-service allows customers experiencing service issues to schedule their own trouble call appointments through My Account, online and via the app for mobile devices.

When customers try to resolve their Xfinity Internet or TV issues using My Account, the system automatically runs a Premise Health Test. Customers whose services are detected to be All Out or those experiencing low MoCA PhyRates or Degraded Internet can schedule a service appointment online.

Customers with a mobile number on the account automatically receive a text confirmation of the service appointment, along with real-time updates about the technician's arrival. Customers can request an earlier appointment, or cancel or reschedule their existing appointment from the text alert.

We're introducing a new option for customers to change their bill due date. Customers will have the flexibility to change their due date

or designate the specific day they want their automatic payment to process, avoiding repeat delinquency and regular late fee assessments. This option is only processed through self-service channels to allow customers to confirm the change themselves and to ensure they understand how the change impacts their next two billing statements. Refer to the Change the Due Date on Your Bill document in Einstein, which can be shared with customers.

Customers who elect to reset their TV Box or modem through the phone will now be presented with an option to wait on hold or receive a text message once the reset is complete. Customers will only be connected with an agent once the reset is finished. When the customer reaches an agent, the system identifies if a previous reset was attempted.

Waiting for the reset to complete means customers don't have to speak with an agent if the refresh resolves the issue, and frees up agents to support customers requiring assistance. When the customer reaches an agent, we know the reset is complete and troubleshooting can proceed without being impacted by the reset process.


