#### A DISAPPOINTMENT – BUT NOT A BUST

On May 15th at 7:00 a.m. a contingent of Bay Lake residents arrived at the Eagles facility just down the street from our park. In a whirlwind of frenzied activity, multiple truckloads (and SUV-loads) of plants and donated rummage sale items were made ready for an onslaught of customers.

At 8:00 a.m., the official start time of the Eagles-coordinated rummage sale, we had all our ducks in a row. Then we glanced around the room and suddenly realized that Bay Lake residents were on duty at six of the nine tables set up for business. Yes, just nine tables.

This turned out to be a TINY rummage sale by our standards.

And the number of customers who came to the sale turned out to be super-tiny by our standards. Apparently the total advertising effort was comprised of a notice on the Eagles Facebook page, and a small sign placed at the curb saying, "Garage Sale Today – 8 to 2." There were no newspaper advertisements, street banners, extensive social media postings, etcetera.

That, in a nutshell, explains the bottom-line results that we achieved:

Additionally, "Carol & Karol" turned in \$203 for plants they sold to Bay Lake residents between February 22, 2020 (i.e. last year's sale) and May 15, 2021 (this year's sale), bringing the plant total up to \$493, and the 2021 rummage sale net total up to \$629.

In years gone by the rummage sale revenue was earmarked for "entertainment." However, as dues and event fees declined, the rummage sale income was simply included in the homeowners association general operating fund. That likely will be the case again this time since, thanks largely to the Coronavirus, our expenses exceeded our income last year by more than \$6,200 – taking a considerable chunk out of our reserves.

The \$426 of "net sales at the Eagles" was not very much money considering all the work contributed by a lot of people. Our most genuine and heart-felt thanks go out the following folks – along with our sincere apologies to anyone who was inadvertently left off the list. (If you recognize that someone was missed, please let me know so that it can be rectified in a follow-up.)

First, there were all the people who participated in three "shed cleaning days" – going through the rummage sale and decorations storage sheds, hand sorting the "keeper" from the non-saleable inventory. It was hot, tiring work, and the volunteers involved have already been thanked publicly in Alert and newsletter articles, so I won't list them all again here.

Next there were the plant sale people. Topping that list, of course, are Carol Gilchrist (organizer extraordinaire) and Karol Nickerson, along with the horde of residents who donated, potted and nurtured the plants. On the 14th and 15th Robert Conway, Tom Guist, Dev and Peggy Cammer, Herb Van Dyke and Helen Baker helped load, transport, unload and stage the way more than 100 plants, while all day Saturday Carol, Karol and Judy Gerarge handled customer interactions: cajoling shoppers to take home a plant (or two or three), answering plant care and selection questions, and collecting payments.

Finally, there was the rummage crew who worked together to load, transport, unload, stage, sell, repack and clean up – a short day's work Friday but a **long** day's work Saturday... for a committed and conscientious crew: Joan Goering, Joyce Martin, George and Becki Phelps, Tom Priar, Linda Wood, Laura and Steve Medich, Dena Swain, Inga Baughman, Ginny Casper, Bonnie and Rudy Heintz, Laura Connor and Susan Rollison.

With so few shoppers on hand to buy our stuff, we had more than a dozen plants and a **ton** of rummage left over at the end of the day. The plants were donated to the Eagles for them to sell in support of their children's charity. About eight storage crates of "high value" rummage were returned to the shed for next year's sale; the rest we hauled away (e.g. Habitat for Humanity) so we'd have room in the shed to accept new donations for our 2022 event.

Yes, we are planning to have another rummage sale in February of 2022. It will probably be our last one since our volunteer base is dwindling. And yes, we are now accepting donations of saleable merchandise for that event. However, except for plants the 2022 sale will be "indoors only" – which means we won't be able to display/sell furniture, bicycles or other large items.





But... it is also the date of one of our holiday celebration meals sponsored by ELS! Mark the date and time -1:00 p.m. – on your calendar now.


The fare will be *traditional American picnic*. Hamburgers, hotdogs, famous Kloian beans (okay, that's not so traditional), and potato chips.

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
