PARK UPDATE

Depending on your circumstances, it may have been a quite a while now since you've even *seen* the park. If that's the case, you needn't worry though – there haven't been many physical changes in the last year. Most of the changes were of the "hidden" variety.

First, the <u>really</u> good news: Elsa caused virtually <u>no</u> damage to any Bay Lake homes or park property. Once more Nokomis was protected by (take your choice) spirits guarding sacred Indian burial grounds, our patron Princess Nokomis, or the natural topology of the land which nudges hurricanes to either the east or the west around us.

The collapsed storm drain pipe under Gardenia between Carissa and Oleander has been dug up and replaced. The contractor appears to have done a great job of repaying the street in that area, not just patching it.

The exterior kitchen door in the clubhouse had apparently swollen during the lock-down, and could not be shut after it had been opened to take out trash. Mark planed the excess material off and it now operates properly.

As this update is being written, the lake fountain is not working – again. The pump motor failed and will be replaced under warranty. Like countless other items these days, it is on backorder. None are in stock because "manufacturing" has not yet recovered from the virus lockdown. *Continued on page 2*

The third pool party of the season is scheduled for Sunday, August 8th, at 10:00 a.m. Yes, a <u>breakfast</u> potluck / pool party!



Where Y'all From?



Making a plan and being prepared ahead of time will relieve a lot of the stress caused by an impending storm. I learned this lesson the hard way in 2017.
