#### Support the NVFD

As a Bay Lake resident you should have received an \$85 invoice in early September from the Nokomis Volunteer Fire Department.

Many new residents – and perhaps some long-time residents – probably saw the bill and thought, "Wow, here's another scam. They're always coming up with something new to swindle unsuspecting people."

However, what you received was actually a solicitation even though it was labeled an "invoice." Further, the Nokomis Volunteer Fire Department is a legitimate 501(c)(4) charitable organization that provides our community with valuable, essential services.

I whole-heartedly endorse the NVFD and urge you to pay the "Readiness to Serve – Annual Fire Service Fee. Any additional donation you make is much appreciated by them and is used only to purchase new Firefighter Safety Equipment.

If you have misplaced your invoice, call the NVFD on the special phone line they have set up: (941) 780-7939.

The fee is due by October 1st each year.

#### What benefits come with paying your fee?

If you have a fire service call at your address and you are not current on your annual fire service fee, NVFD will respond - but you will Continued on page 2

be charged the FEMA-authorized rates for all equipment and personnel time spent on the fire service event.

If you have a fire service call at your address and you are current on your annual fee, you will not have to pay NVFD anything for the response service.

The fire departments of Venice, Englewood, North Port and Sarasota County all receive money through tax assessments. The Nokomis fire department receives no money through assessments and depends on the Annual Fire Service Fees they collect.

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# RECYCLING DO'S AND DON'TS

Here is a reminder from Waste Management of things to recycle and not to recycles. Wash or at least rinse items before recycling.

Plastics: ONLY the plastics with the recycling numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 7, *NOT 6*.

Also recycle aluminum cans, foil trays, steel and tin cans, all color glass bottles and jars, drink boxes, milk and juice cartons, newspapers, mixed paper, magazines and flattened cardboard. NO PLASTIC BAGS. Plastic bags can be recycled in the proper bins for them in front of many grocery stores.

#### NO, NO, NO...

Broken glass, ceramic tiles, dishes, glassware, eyeglasses, flower pots (ceramic, clay or plastic), clothes hangers, hardcover books, light bulbs, mirrors, packing materials, plastic deli trays, plastic toys, pots, pans, ovenware, STYROFOAM, window glass, yard waste, plastic bags, electronics, paper plates, paper towels, napkins, bedding, rugs, auto parts, hoses, holiday lights or diapers.

DO NOT PLACE the garbage, recycling or yard waste to the curb before 5pm the day before pickup.

Remember to keep the recycling bin 3 feet away from everything.

#### NEW PHONE RULE AFFECT US!!!

Effective Sunday, October 24, 2021 you **must** dial 10 digits when placing any call to area code 941.



Historically you have been able to place **local** 941 area code calls by dialing just the "main" 7 digits.

Stated another way... Suppose your full phone number starts with area code 941. For example, (941) 488 1234. Until October 24th you can call me at home by entering just the main 7 digits of my phone number: 375-8110.

Starting October 24th you will have to dial 10 digits: 941 375 8110.

That is true even if you are calling from a land line next door!

It is also true if you are calling from a cell phone, regardless of what area code it is configured with.

#### Here's a tip you may find useful.

Though seven-digit dialing is still available until October 24, you should immediately start dialing 10 digits (area code + telephone number) for all local calls so you can get used to it.

#### Two more tips...

Check all your services and equipment that might be programmed to dial seven-digit local numbers, and add the area code where necessary to dial 10-digit numbers. Especially check your cell phone's contact list, since area codes are not often added automatically.

Other examples: Automatic dialing equipment, medical monitoring devices, fax machines, fire alarms, security systems, speed dialers, call forwarding settings, and voicemail services.

Also, remember to include your full 10-digit number when filling forms on websites or advertising materials. You may need to order new checks, personal or pet ID tags, and other such items.

#### Anything else?

The new dialing requirement should not change the price you pay for any phone services.

You will continue to dial 1+ area code + telephone number for all long-distance calls from a landline.

You will still dial just three digits to reach 911 (emergency services), and any other 3-digit services you may currently be using, including those below. (3-digit services vary by community. Not all are available in Florida.)

- 211 (community information and referrals)
- 311 (non-emergency police/governmental services)
- 411 (directory information)
- 511 (national travelers assistance)
- 611 (phone company customer service)
- 711 (hearing/speech impairment assistance)
- 811 (pipeline/utilities excavation damage protection)
- 988 (available after 7/16/2022: Suicide Prevention Hotline)

# Baby, You Can Drive My Car





When we asked her about her hesitation, she explained that she wasn't sure she would be able to hear his cries.


Looking back, it was probably this heightened anxiousness that prompted her to get a better-quality hearing aid that enabled her to hear with ease in these situations.
