MY FAVORITE EASY RECIPE

I'd like to start this 'new column' by sharing an easy guacamole recipe I learned while vacationing in Mexico in 1999. This simple, but tasty, recipe was made from scratch, and served 'table side'. The following is how I make fresh guacamole:

Using a ceramic or SS bowl, remove the pulp from a ripe avocado. Season with salt, pepper and a dash of garlic powder. I use a no-sodium salt and freshly ground black pepper and garlic powder, not garlic salt. Chop a small amount of fresh cilantro, approx. ¼ cup, or more, to taste (not dried cilantro). Add some minced onion (about two TBLs). Add some chopped tomato (about three TBLs). Cut a fresh lime in 4 quarters and squeeze one-quarter into the mix. Using a fork, mash the pulp and whip the entire mix until smooth either with a whisk or a fork. Taste the mix and add more lime juice, onion, tomato, cilantro, if desired. Oftentimes, I'll make the guac with two avocados and store the unused guac in an air tight bowl and refrigerate, ready for a quick snack the next day! Don't forget to buy your favorite blue or yellow corn chips.

A young African American male, first time attending college, rode his bicycle three days in the hot August sun, and two nights, from his home town with only a pup tent and a sleeping bag strapped to his bicycle. He was bent on attending school, to make something of himself. He arrived one week ahead of opening day just to make sure he was there on time to start school.

With no place to sleep he camped out on the Savannah State University lawn, that is until the campus police discovered his illegal sleeping quarters. Instead of placing the lad under arrest, or throwing him off the property, after listening to his heart-warming story, the campus police pooled their money together and delivered him to a nearby motel so he can sleep in a real bed.

The news media grabbed a hold of and ran with this story. Soon, money was pouring in to help this young man. One donor gave him a pre-paid credit card so he can purchase clothing and shoes.

Money poured in to help pay for his dorm. A go-fund-me page was set up which brought in over \$30,000 to help him with tuition and housing. A local McDonalds manager offered him a job. All of this helped this determined young man to make something of himself and soon thereafter, he graduated with honors at SSU. I'm certain he's paying it forward.

MIRACLES DO HAPPEN

When I was chef at the Chicago Road House, West Dearborn, MI in the early 70's, my best kitchen assistant was David. David was secretly married to Patricia, a server. One Friday night while cruising in their VW Bug along Hines Drive, a two lane road, they were struck head-on. David died instantly with a broken neck. Pat suffered many injuries. I was informed by other servers that they started to attend church at the corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Newburg, in Livonia. I visited that church and spoke to their pastor about David and Pat's accident. He already knew of the accident. I was also told the following Sunday would be a 'healing service'. So I took this information and planned a visit to the hospital to see how Pat was doing. She suffered from a broken spine, one leg and one arm in traction, cuts and bruises everywhere. Pat encouraged me to pick her up on Sunday morning to take her to church. After signing several release documents and several arguments between the doctors and nurses the hospital agreed to release her to my care. When I arrived at the church I was greeted by several ushers, who lifted her up the stairs and I wheeled her to the front pew. Singing was in progress when we arrived. A few minutes later this power came down on the front pew, knocking me to the floor. As I looked up, Pat jumped out of the wheelchair and started dancing and yelling hallelujah. She was completely healed as later that day the doctors did confirm. No one, not even Pastor John, 'laid hands' on her. I know not where that power came from or what that 'power' was exactly, but I do know it was truly a miracle to behold.

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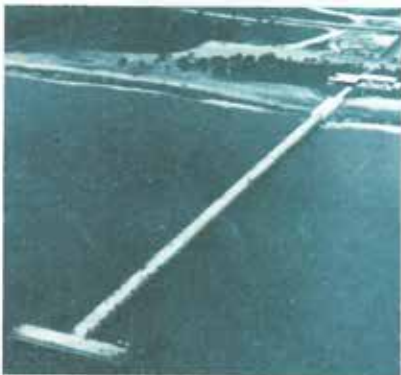
A BLAST FROM THE PAST

The Venice-Nokomis beachline is separated by the famous fishing jetties.

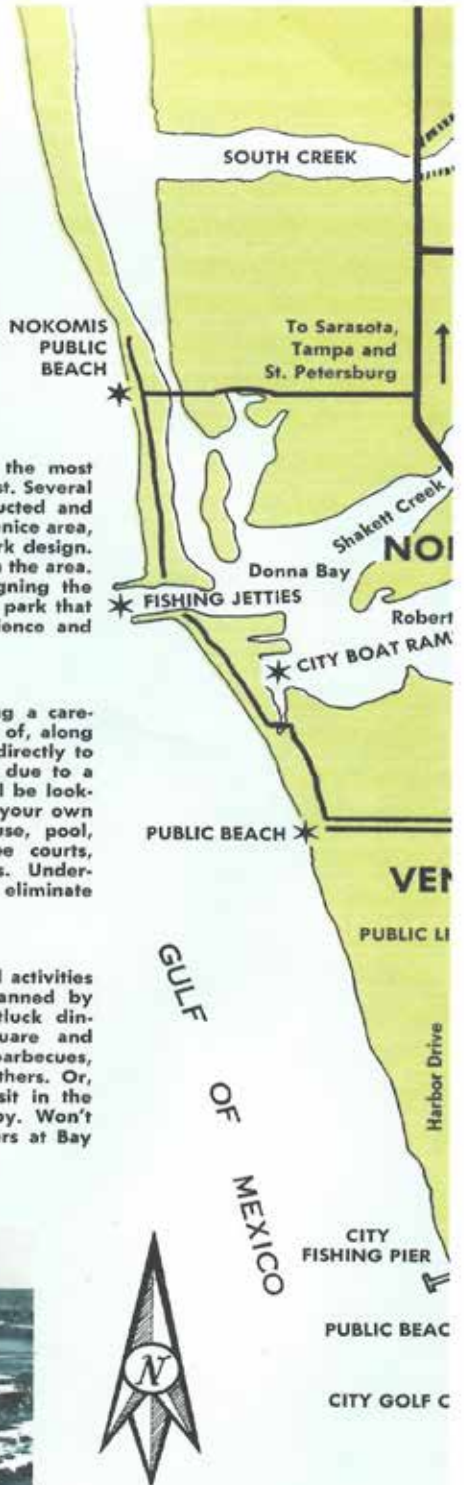

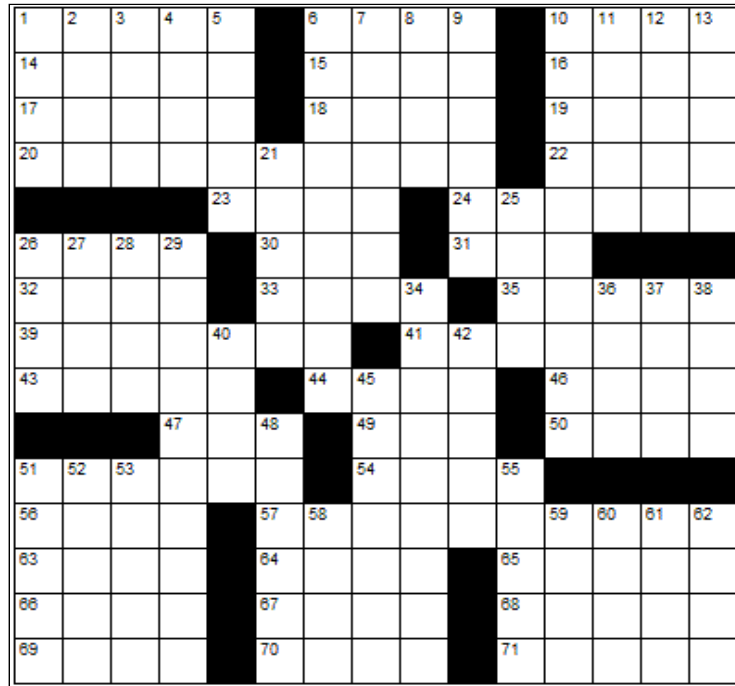
Lake Venice golf course is located on Red Lake and the Gulf. It is only one of several courses near Bay Lake Estates.

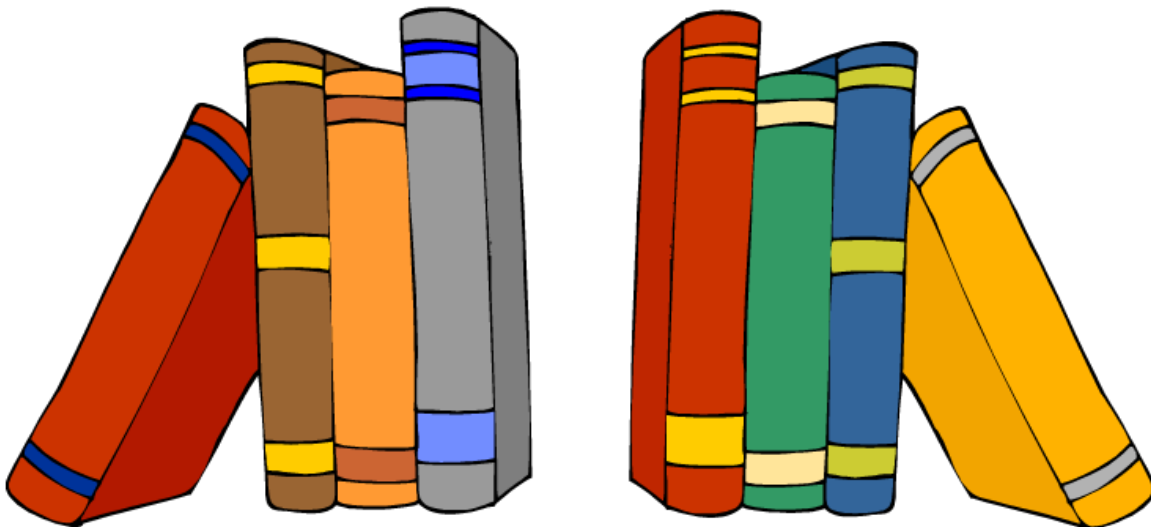

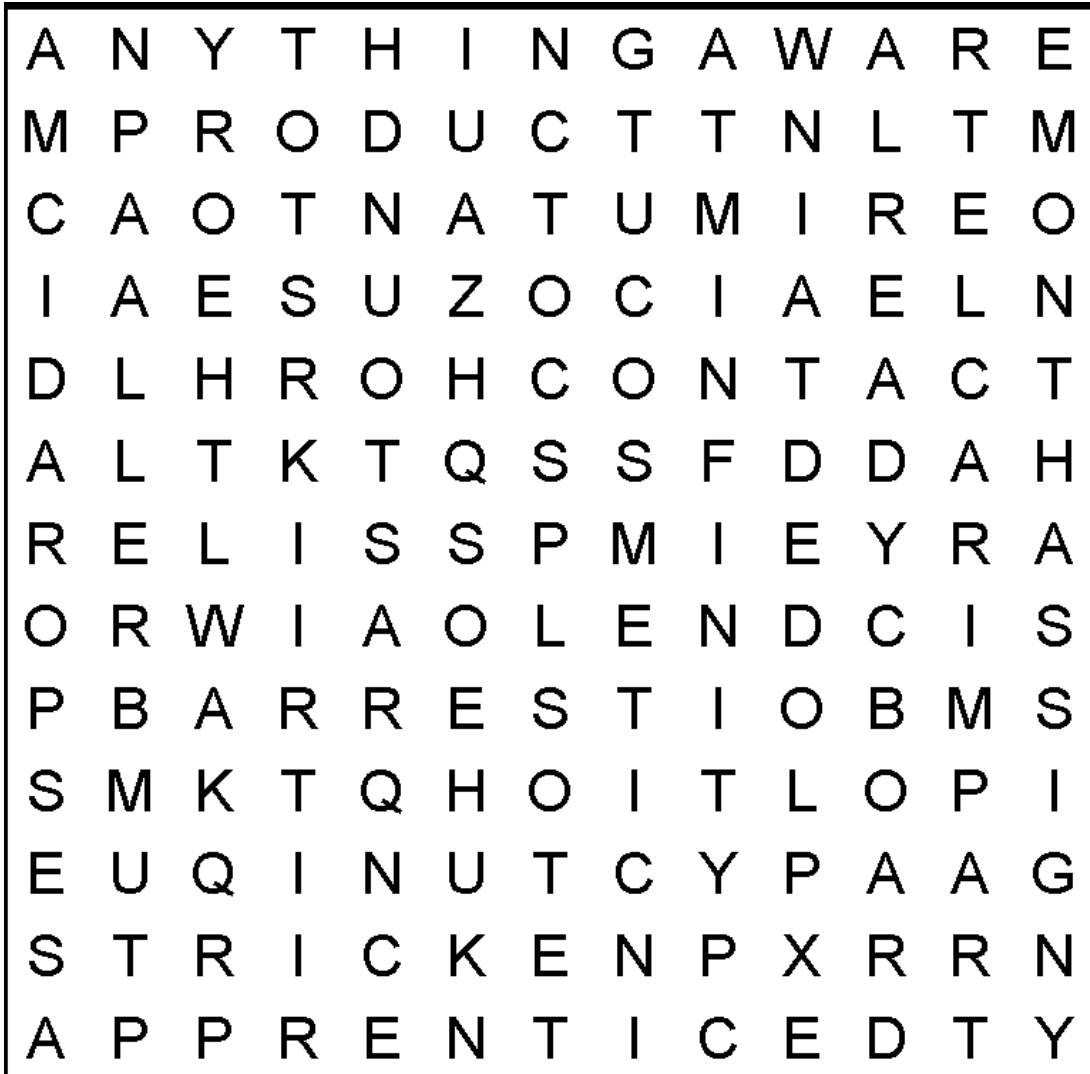
