MY FAVORITE EASY RECIPE

CHICKEN A LA KING

- 1 cup diced cooked chicken
- 1 10oz package frozen mixed vegetables
- 1 1/2 cups chicken broth
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1 5oz can evaporated milk

Step 1

Combine chicken, vegetables and broth in a medium saucepan over medium-low heat. Stir together and let simmer until heated through.

Step 2

In a small bowl beat cornstarch into evaporated milk and add to chicken mixture. Reduce heat to low and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened.

Season with salt and pepper.

When I make this, I usually make my own broth.

I use the leftovers from a rotisserie chicken. I put the entire chicken in a pot and simmer it for two hours. Remove bones after it cools and refrigerate till next day. Fresh broth with very little sodium.

The purpose of the "golden buzzer" is to send the performer straight to the "Live Rounds", rather than see them continue competing and claw their way to the top. The "buzzer" is the primo compliment for the artist. Rather than "vote" the performer through to the next round, any judge, including the show's host, Terry Crews, can smack the "golden buzzer" simply because they loved the artist's performance. For example, when you see and hear Mandy Harvey (2017), the female deaf mute, sing, you would honestly think you were in the company of angels. Then we have Kodi Lee (2019), a blind and autistic singer/piano player who actually won AGT, went on tour and now appears in Las Vegas. This song artist will warm your heart.

When the Detroit City Choir performed, their act blew the judges and the thousands of people in the audience, away. Because of their outstanding performance, the City of Detroit awarded them with "A Key to the City" and a big fat check for one million dollars.

Darci Lynne (2017), the 11 year-old singing ventriloquist also won AGT. Her sell out tours brought her world-wide fame. Much older now, she once returned to AGT and again, her performance along with 2 singing puppets (how does she do that?) was off the chain crazy good.



Simon's favorite, Jane, a cancer victim, an 80 pound mass of a woman, soon passed away following her AGT performance. She busted out singing a Janis Joplin song and blew the roof off the house. Outstanding artist.

In all there were 15 Golden Buzzer moments to watch. I've seen this show several times simply because it is highly entertaining and it's free.

MIRACLES DO HAPPEN

Part II. It was the year 1943 and the USA was deeply involved in WWII on two fronts. My mother, Doris, from Part I of the August newsletter, worked at the Ford Mo Co as a typist. She was also a volunteer Air Raid Warden at night. The job of an air raid warden was to walk designated streets, for several blocks, 7

nights a week, to make sure no home had lights on at night in the event the Nazi's were to send bomber planes over Detroit.

Henry Ford had re-tooled his assembly line at the Ford Rouge plant in Dearborn, MI., to build trucks, jeeps and the famous, Sherman tank. This powerful and very effective tank helped win the war. He also built a one-mile-long assembly line in Ypsilanti, MI at the Willow Run Airport and mass produced the famous B-24 bomber (see photos).

One evening, while walking the streets of Detroit, mom saw lights on in a house in the distance and approached with caution. Instead of knocking on the door, she placed her ear to the door and heard what she believed were people speaking in German. She reported this immediately to the authorities.

Yes, this was in fact a Nazi spy ring monitoring God-knows-what with their Ham Radio, and this nest of spies came to an abrupt end thanks to mom's sharp thinking. Henry Ford caught wind of this incident and personally handed mom a very special award for her bravery along with a job well done. Who knows what may have happened to the Ford Mo Co or the City of Detroit. If she had knocked on the door instead of getting help the end result may have been catastrophic and perhaps, I wouldn't be here to talk about it.

Years later (in the 60;s), following my brother, Bernie's high school graduation, mom wrote a personal letter to Henry Ford (she was a very good letter writer) asking him to employ her son, Bernard. Henry must have given the order to contact Bernie and he was soon employed at the Ford Mo Co as a draftsman, and was then schooled by Ford Mo Co to become an engineer. The amazing element to this miracle story is, despite massive lay-offs from time to time, Bernie was never laid off. He worked at the Ford Mo Co glass building on Michigan Ave. for

almost 40 years before retiring. Two miracles in one. Part III and the conclusion to this trilogy to be continued in the October newsletter.

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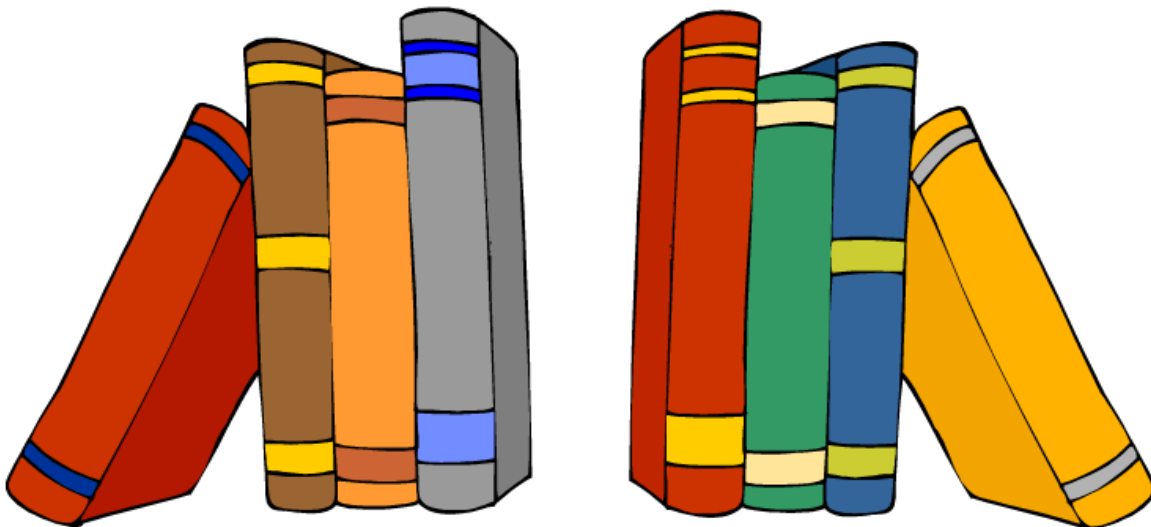
