Hello from Canada everyone!

I hope everyone is enjoying the summer. I hear it's been



extremely hot for those of you still at the park. Smoke has finally dissipated in my neck of the woods in Canada. As most of you know, we've had a record-setting season of wildfires that started in early May. As of July 9th, 3,717 fires had burned 22,771,070 acres of natural forests displacing thousands of people and millions of our abounding wildlife (the ones that could out-run the fires). As of July 9th, there were still 815 active wildfires, 495 of which were deemed out of control. Smoke from the wildfires could be seen and felt in many U.S. states and all the way to Europe. Thanks to our international allies, their aid has helped control and reduce the impact of the fires.

Now, some good news !

By the time this newsletter goes out, you may have seen a Mobile Farmer's Market in our park or received Steve's email announcing the dates. The organization, Saving Our Seniors (SOS) will be coming to our park monthly to offer fresh produce to seniors for FREE! Yes, you read that right, it's absolutely free!!

Kelli Casto founded this non-profit organization to help seniors fight inflation and maintain healthier lifestyles. She buys her produce every morning (at 3 am!!) to ensure she has good, fresh produce to distribute to over 20,000 seniors each month. Each household can receive 8 different produce choices. For example, two sweet potatoes count as one produce choice.

If you happen to see Kelli at the market, please thank her for her dedication and commitment to seniors - and while you're at it, swing by the office to also thank Leslee who made arrangements for the Mobile Farmer's Market to come to Bay Lake Estates.



GEOTHERMAL ENERGY

Geothermal energy—energy



Currently, the U.S. leads the world for <u>installed</u> geothermal capacity, with more than 3.7 gigawatts (GW). With continued R&D successes and strong industry adoption, <u>geothermal could meet more</u> <u>than 10% of U.S. electricity demands.</u>

Here are some interesting facts about geothermal energy:

1. Baseload energy - it's always on: Geothermal power plants produce electricity consistently, running 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The power output of a geothermal power plant is highly predictable and stable, thus facilitating energy planning with remarkable accuracy. Geothermal power plants are also an excellent means of meeting baseload energy demand, or the minimum level of demand on an electrical grid during a 24-hour period.

2. Geothermal energy can heat, cool, and generate electricity: Geothermal energy can be used in different ways depending on the resource and technology chosen—heating and cooling buildings through geothermal heat pumps, generating electricity through geothermal power plants, and heating structures through direct-use applications. While geothermal power generation is mainly concentrated in the western U.S., these applications will help expand geothermal energy use **geographically**.

3. Over 100 years of geothermally sourced energy: The first ever geothermal plant was set up in Larderello, Italy, in 1904. Steam from that geothermal source was used to turn a small turbine which powered five light bulbs. Today, the U.S. leads the world in geothermal power generation, providing more than 3.7 GW to the national grid. In fact, the first modern geothermal district heating plant was developed in 1892 in Boise, Idaho. DOE supports direct-use efforts, striving to heat more homes and reduce more energy bills.

4. The largest geothermal plant in the world is located in California: The Geysers Geothermal Complex located north of San Francisco, California, is comprised of 18 power plants and is the largest geothermal installation in the world. **DOE funding** at Calpine Corporation's Caldwell Ranch site at the Geysers is a first-ever reopened abandoned steam field, validating universally applicable technologies. 5. Geothermal can be closer than you think: Research funded by the Geothermal Technologies Office seeks ways to tap into geothermal resources the nation. Traditionally, geothermal across resources are most accessible in the western states, from Colorado and New Mexico up to Utah, Nevada, Idaho and Oregon. However, with the development of enhanced geothermal systems (EGS) technologies and additional research in deep direct-use (DDU) capabilities, geothermal energy will potentially be accessible across the country.


There is potentially over 100 GW of geothermal energy accessible with the development of EGS technologies. Additionally, at a large scale, **DDU applications** can potentially be used to replace old, or develop new, district heating and cooling systems in hotels, office buildings, hospital complexes, military installations, and other large energy end-uses and expand geothermal as a renewable thermal energy in large portions of the U.S. Visit the <u>Geothermal</u> <u>Technologies Office website</u> for Energy 101 videos, news updates, and program information.

RESPONSE TO THE "RESPONSE"

This verbiage can go on forever but our response to the "Response" will be our final response. If further conversation is required, please convene a meeting so all interested parties can attend and add to the "Response".

1. The rummage sale is a voluminous amount of work but not to sound repetitive "many hands make light work" an appropriate adage to any labor-intensive activity. By managing tasks with many hands is a given solution to any labor-intensive activity. I was background support for previous rummage sales organizers and according to the co-chairs it was not overwhelming nor arduous in nature. It was a testament to the coming together of the Bay Lake community in one common goal.

2. See item 1. plus, your concern for the health of our residents is admirable but us "old Folks" know our limits and will continue to contribute as long as possible.

3. We need to manage our dates more vigilantly by whomever is responsible for establishing time and dates. As a "taxi" driver I constantly heard that our sale was one of many in the area and conflicts certainly arose as to which ones to attend. By the way our taxi service is highly regarded by all customers I had the pleasure of escorting. (Just a side note.)

4. The shed issue is certainly a concern, however, I believe we have been granted space for future storage. (So far just a rumor). We can have a shed in place in a matter of days not months. As we have suggested in the past used sea containers or other factory-made sheds can be in place in the matter of 24 hours. There is no need for outside storage.

5. You are missing one of the salient objectives and results of the rummage sale. The rummage sale brings the community together as a cohesive community like no other activity. With the right mindset it can be a barrel of fun. Certainly, it is easy, but nary impossible, to ask each resident to contribute money to any worthwhile cause but you may be missing the point that community spirit can't be measured in dollars and cents.

6. I'm asking the community not to give up on the rummage sale in spite of objections from a few residents. Having said that we need to manage the sale to optimize attendance from outside Bay Lake and ensure that the burden of hands-on work is evenly distributed.

MY FAVORITE EASY RECIPE

Following the July 4th lunch, I was asked to print the recipe for the caramelized onions that everyone thoroughly enjoyed with their dog or



burger (the bowl was emptied before I was able to get some for myself).

Onions are naturally sweet; and as caramel comes from the simple cooking of sugar when you slowly cook onions over an extended period of time, the natural sugars in the onions caramelize, making the result <u>intensely</u> and <u>wonderfully</u> flavorful.

The <u>smallest</u> batch I suggest making is using one whole onion, preferably a sweet Vidalia or a White onion but definitely not a yellow onion. Left-over caramelized onions can be used on a variety of food items, such as a meat loaf, steak or pork chops either on the grill or cooked indoors.

Melt about one-half stick of butter (you may need a tad more) and drizzle in some olive oil.

Using a peeled onion, slice off the ends the onion and slice the onion in half before slicing the onion slices about 1/8th of an inch thick. It's much easier to slice the half onion while it lies flat on a cutting board. Then place the slices over the melted butter on #3 of your electric stove, between low and medium. Don't' worry about separating the slices until after it begins to cook down.

Lightly sprinkle some salt (sodium free) and fresh ground pepper across the onions, then sprinkle some sweet Hungarian Paprika to give the onions some color and a touch of that Paprika flavor.

While cooking the onions, take a spatula and begin to break the onion apart, leaving the onion slices intact, meaning half-sliced and not quartered.

I'll usually put a lid over the sauté' pan for a few minutes when they are close to being finished, which helps soften the onion. Cook until the onion screams, "I've had enough, thank you very much."

SAUTEED MUSHROOMS: Purchase 1 package of sliced Bella mushrooms, unless you're a die-hard cook who enjoys slicing your mushrooms. Melt some butter, but not too much, then sprinkle a little salt and a dash of pepper over the shrooms and while they cook down add a splash of Marsala sweet wine. The wine will cook down but brings tremendous flavor to the schrooms.

Pan sauteed mushrooms or caramelized onions may be enjoyed on burgers, steaks, pork or veal chops, over a bed of garlic mashed potatoes or a topping for pizza. There are many uses for caramelized onions. The bottle of Sweet Marsala wine from ABC or Total wine may be used to create dishes like Chicken Marsala or Veal Marsala paired with garlic mashed potatoes and the vegetable of your choice.






