ARE WE ALONE?

One of the oldest questions facing humanity is whether we are alone in the universe. Now, thanks to a richer understanding of the conditions that support life in our own oceans, we have an opportunity to answer that question, and to do so within the lifetime of the current human generation.

For decades, planetary scientists looked to the “Goldilocks Zone”—the not-too-hot, not-too-cold



region around a star where liquid water can exist on the surface of a planetary body—as the place where life would most likely be found. That meant exoplanets—planets orbiting distant stars—were our only hope for finding extraterrestrial life, but exploring there would require faster-than-light travel.

NASA's Galileo mission to Jupiter, followed by the Cassini mission to Saturn, changed everything when they showed there was another, hidden, habitable zone right under our noses: We now know that at least half a dozen planetary bodies here in our own solar system host salt water oceans beneath a thick cover of ice, some in contact with a rocky seafloor.

To seek out new worlds, technology is advancing quickly. Boosted by the James Webb Space Telescope, launched at the end of 2021, the search for alien life over the next decade now has **real depth**. Next-gen enormous rockets coming soon promise space missions that can go farther and deploy more powerful telescopes. Privately funded scopes and revolutionary observational techniques using our own sun as a gravitational lens foreshadow major advances in the near future.

Legendary astronomer and science educator Carl Sagan was a firm believer that the cosmos is full of intelligent beings. He even more vehemently valued scientific reason and evidence and was known to say that extraordinary claims—even if they support your most wished-for dreams—require extraordinary evidence. Given his brand of skepticism, one would hope that he would be pleased about the latest tools we've built to determine if we are indeed alone.

In the 1997 film, *Contact*, based on the 1985 science-fiction novel written by Sagan about the discovery of an extraterrestrial radio signal, the main character, astronomer Ellie Arroway, says, “The universe is a pretty big place ... so if it's just us, it seems like an awful waste of space.”

It would appear over the past few years there are more and more stories surfacing on the news about

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UFO's. On July 24th, 2023, CUOMO News (channel 408) broadcast a 30 minute special concerning crash material found from UFO's.

Our generation has been privy to decades of secrets, beginning with the UFO crash in Roswell, NM in 1947. U.S. government agency, possessed information on the alleged crash and recovery of an extraterrestrial vehicle and its alien occupants near Roswell, N.M. in July 1947.

There are, at the present, literally hundreds of UFO cases and thousands of sightings.

In the year 2007 I rented a condo for several years in Carolina Beach, NC, right on the beach, facing the Atlantic. At night I would sit on the deck and star gaze. One night I noticed these orange glowing balls appearing in the far distance (the horizon), then disappearing as quickly as they appeared. I called my brother Arnold who had followed UFO's and their sightings for many years and he confirmed they were most likely UFO's. One evening I was entertaining several dinner guests on the deck and as I was telling them my orange glowing UFO story they looked up at the sky and asked me if what they were seeing is a UFO. This craft sped across the sky at speeds we are not yet capable of attaining.

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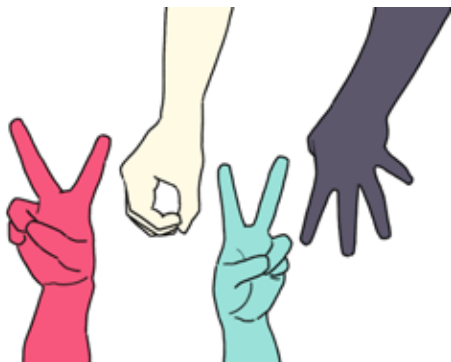

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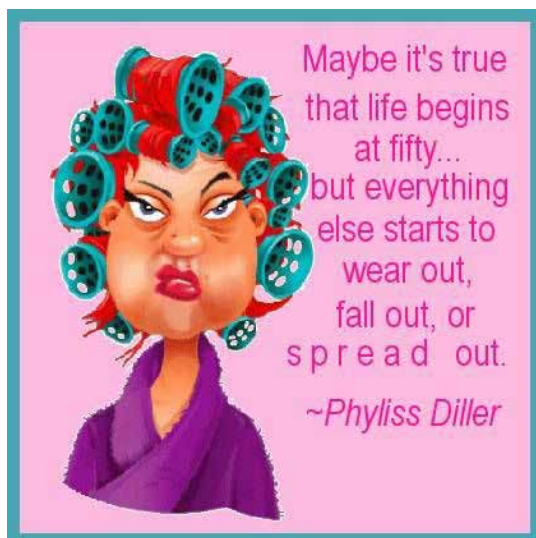
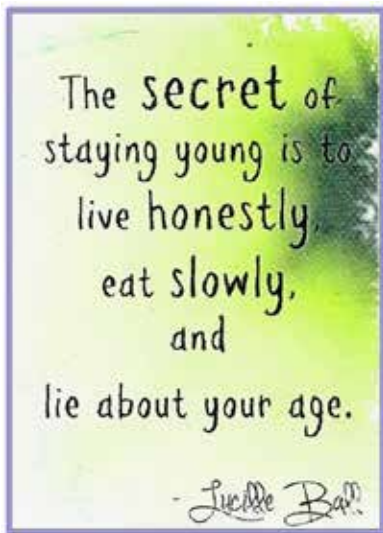

HONOR RESTORED

(as seen on NBC's Nightly News, Monday, November 13th, 2023.)



Without question, our United States government has made, and will most likely continue to make, mistakes and some

serious errors of judgment. This is just one of those stories

After more than a **century**, honor was finally restored for the 110 black men of the 24th Infantry - 3rd Battalion who was convicted for murder, mutiny and assault following a riot they did not start.

The regiment arrived in the Jim Crow South in July, 1917. Things soon got out of control and malady ensued and over 19 whites and blacks died in that riot. 110 soldiers stood trial and all were convicted.



Recently, in 2023, the U.S. Army authorized an honorable discharge for all 110 soldiers, allowing the opportunity for any survivors to qualify for military benefits.

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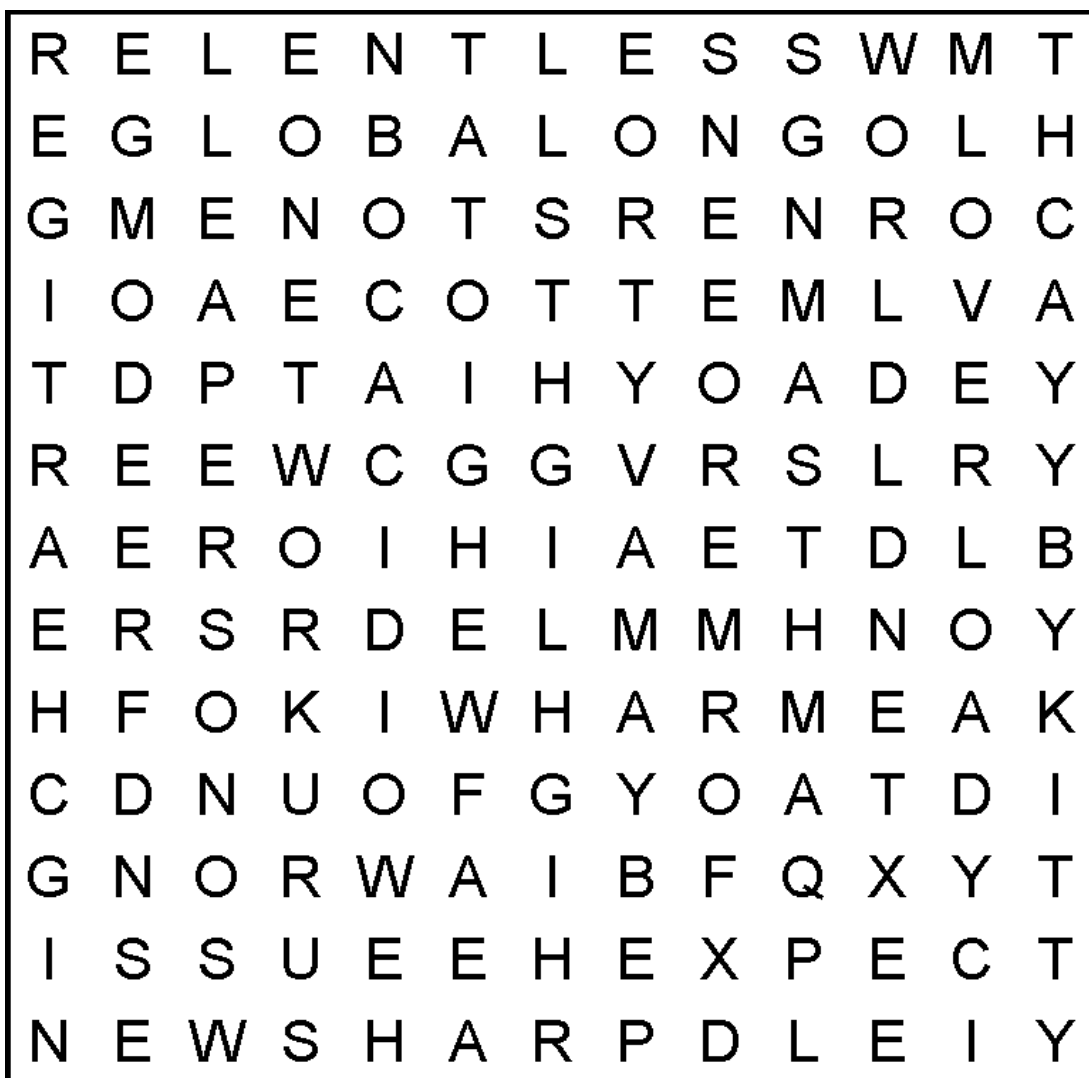
