It has been a challenging year at BLE, and for many residents, it has been absolutely devastating. Many suffered significant damages in the wake of two destructive storms and many had to move out... a crushing loss for all of us.

Despite all the setbacks, I am happy to report that we have also seen many accomplishments and improvements. Although some of these may appear to be small or insignificant, a lot work is usually required behind the scenes:

- 1. Approved over 70 amendments to our by-laws.
- 2. New Welcome Package for newcomers.
- 3. New HOA shed that is much larger than the previous dilapidated one.
- 4. Negotiated a new 3-year rent agreement with ELS.
- 5. Negotiated a 'rent-relief' program for homeowners whose homes were destroyed during the hurricanes.
- 6. Recruited several volunteers for HOA committees & events.
- 7. Installed message board outside of clubhouse to get more exposure for HOA events.
- 8. Received over \$3,500 from ELS in gifts, gift cards and funding for our Beach Party.
- 9. Hurricane Helene and Milton repairs completed to Park buildings.
- 10. Repair and replacement of existing street lights to solar.
- 11. Added 8 new solar street lights with new poles.
- 12. New light poles to replace existing older wood poles or leaning poles.

- 21. New entrance lights.

THE MONARCH BUTTERFLY

Monarch butterfly <u>super generation</u> live up to 9 times longer than most monarchs, migrates thousands of miles.

One of the most remarkable and mysterious migrations in the natural world happens from Mexico to the United States. Tens of millions of monarch butterflies are on an epic aerial journey home. They've spent the winter hanging out in trees in a forest on a remote mountain in Mexico, resting up after flying all the way from Canada and the northern U.S. where they were born. It's believed monarchs have been making this journey for thousands of years, but there's a lot fewer of them than there used to be. The population in Mexico has declined 70% in the last 30 years.

The 60 minutes team (including Anderson Cooper) arrived there in February, just in time to watch the monarchs emerge from their slumber, and begin to take flight. The monarchs come to the mountains in Michoacan in central Mexico starting in late October.

One of the guides in Mexico, Jorge Rickards, is the director of the nonprofit World Wildlife Fund in Mexico and in his words he gets excited every year to see the monarchs return. The monarchs roost in patches of fir and pine trees 11,000 feet up. There are some 66 million of them there, but it's hard to see them at first. There are what appear to be clumps of dead leaves hanging from sagging branches. But those are butterflies, tens of thousands of them clustered together in trees all around. The monarchs fall in a kind of hibernation.

On the way to Mexico, they've fattened up on nectar, which helps them survive and rest through the long winter months. The climate on this particular mountain is ideal. The canopy of trees protects the butterflies from storms, and though the air is cool, it's relatively humid so they stay hydrated.

Monarch are sensitive to sound so the guide and

those near the guide need to whisper so as not to disturb the monarchs. The less talk the better.

On the forest floor monarchs litter the ground. But most are not dead. They've just fallen from trees during the night, and their muscles are too cold for them to fly. Those monarchs on the ground may be picked up and cupped in a human's hand and then you can breathe into your cupped hands in order to revive them with your breath. This is done in order to help bring their wing muscles back. When the sun begins to hit the trees, flashes of orange appear. The monarchs are warming and slowly opening their wings.

Court Whelan has been bringing tour groups here and photographing monarchs for more than 20 years. He shows the groups a spot where some butterflies have taken flight. Then, after a few minutes, suddenly... the air is filled with them. This is an extraordinary event to watch.

It's still something of a mystery how these monarchs manage to get there. Most only live about a month. They spend their short lives eating and mating, and females lay eggs. But in late summer and early fall, what's called a super generation of monarchs appear. Hatched as caterpillars, they transform into chrysalises and then, after a week or two, emerge as butterflies — and that's when they do something extraordinary.

The monarchs were discovered by researchers on this Mexico mountain range in 1975 and the Mexican government declared the area a federal reserve 11 years later. But for decades, illegal logging threatened the butterfly's roosting spots, which once covered as much as 45 acres, it's now down to four and a half. World Wildlife Fund has spent years trying to combat the destruction, assessing the health of the forest, measuring the size of butterfly colonies, and planting trees. They've also worked with local communities and indigenous groups to protect the land and help them profit from tourism. The good news is the forest is rebounding.

The butterflies are known to need some trace

elements like salts and whatnot. And it doesn't look like much, but just this little bit of water found in a mud puddle is enough for them to get some water. And then what'll happen is they'll return to the roost before evening.

After about four months in Mexico, this super generation of monarchs are near the end of their long life cycle. They are finally ready to mate and migrate north to lay their eggs. They'll die before they can make it back to where they were born, and their offspring might not live long enough to get there either, but future generations will -- and there's an army of people trying to help them.

Monarchs returning to the U.S. need <u>milkweed</u> <u>plants</u> to lay their eggs on - it's the only source of food their newly born caterpillars will eat. But milkweed is now hard to find. It's been virtually eradicated on agricultural land, because of genetically modified corn and soybean crops that allow for mass spraying of herbicides.

Monarch Watch encourages people to <u>plant</u> <u>milkweed in their gardens</u> and on public land, creating what they call Monarch Waystations. Fifty thousand of them have been planted so far.

Joe says, "I don't think my wife is hearing well. What can I do?" The doctor recommended a simple exercise to determine if it was her hearing. Stand about 50 feet away from your wife, when her back is to you so she can't see you. Ask her a general question and see if she answers. If she doesn't answer, step closer and ask again. If she doesn't answer, take another step closer and ask again. Keep doing this until you know she heard the question and answered it.

Joe went home and did the exercise. Joe stood in the hallway behind his wife while she was in the kitchen cooking. He asked in a clear, steady voice, "Honey, what's for dinner?" No reply. So, he took a step closer and asked again. No reply. So, he took a step closer and asked again.

After five times his wife spun around and yelled, "For the fifth time, chicken!"

ROSEBUDS STEAK & SEAFOOD RESTAURANT - OSPREY

Why I haven't dined at Rosebuds in several years is beyond me. So after years of not dining there I finally went there for dinner in early May with a guest, and not to one of my other fav local restaurants. After all, each time I pass their establishment, when driving north, I'm always impressed that their parking lot is packed by 5:00 - 5:30. They must be doing something right! Why else would the place be so busy by then?

First, I was impressed that I was able to make a reservation by calling about 5 days in advance for a Friday 5:00 dinner the same week. I like calling instead of making a res on-line. This assures me of a table as requested.

Upon examination on-line I found their menu to be exhausting, meaning the selection of appetizers and entrées is so extensive you may need to review their menu on-line prior to going and whittle down your choices to 2 or 3 selections until you are able to speak with a knowledgeable server regarding your choices. The servers always have a handle on what to order to pair with a glass of wine or a cocktail. Otherwise, some folks will sit at the table for a length of time undecided about what to order.

Since Duck is rare to find on any menu in this area, I chose to try their Crispy Duck which I found so very delectable. Duck is one item we never served when I was a Chef. I believe they oven roasted the tasty & seasoned twin legs & thighs (attached) then topped it off under the broiler to create that crispy edge that was very enjoyable to bite into. Nothing worse than trying to eat soft chicken/duck/or turkey skin.

Service was 5 star for sure as was the food that flew out of the kitchen.

Will I be returning soon? You betcha! Can't wait to try their Veal entre'.


